## A good read, if a long one!

The idea is to read through each book of the Bible as you would with any other book, i.e. as a whole, and let it give you its particular message. How many of the books you read one straight after the other obviously depends on you and on the books in question. Some bits are more complicated than others and there are bits none of us really understand, but that is not the point. The aim is to get the general gist of what each book is about. However little you feel you pick up this time round, you'll find that next time you turn to a passage or look up a reference, it may well be a little more meaningful and you'll begin to see how each book adds its own little bit to the overall picture.

The scheme below, off the top of my head, is intended to give a bit of variety between Old and New Testaments, but also put together some of the bits that go together – an impossible aim but still! I've added a few notes which may help you follow the meandering of a warped mind. However the notes are obviously a very succinct personal impression and are longest on the books I know best. You may well feel a particular book conveys a different message to you.

The New Testament bears witness to fact that the Lord Jesus Christ is God's Messiah and our Redeemer, and is the culmination of the story that began in...

The Old Testament which bears witness to God as author of all creation and to His active continuing involvement in history.

Lastly, any errors are mine and the good bits I got from someone else along my path! (Psalm 119.105)

A note on the prophets	They were all utterly convinced of their calling – they had God's word to proclaim. Certainly, they preach judgement for sin (often horrible and violent – but that violent sin is still with us in human behaviour today) but never without also proclaiming God's mercy on those who repent. So don't be put off by the violence of old – it is still with us – and the answer – the mercy of God for those who repent – is still the only solution.  In general the prophets spoke at three levels: (a) God's message for their day, (b) they spoke of the coming Messiah, (c) they
	speak to us.
